generously call the teacher.) I still shudder when I encounter the words "keypunch" or "FORTRAN." In 1981 however, microcomputers had arrived. They seemed much easier to get to, and BASIC was, well, basic. Besides, using little BASIC programs I was able to show my AP Calculus students

that the slope of the secant line did approach a limiting value when you decreased the interval. The computer actually did all of those calculations, so you could really see it happen.
